**Montana Weather:**

Following Warnings for Montana:

- Expect several consecutive days of hot and dry weather, with near-record to record breaking temperatures. Remain hydrated, and remember that fires ignite, easily.
- Multiple consecutive days of highs in the mid to upper 90's with some areas reaching into the 100's by the end of the week.

High temperatures in the 90s to 110s begin in earnest (and low temps in the 50s and 60s) on Monday and will exist through at least July 4th across the entire Northern Rockies. Prolonged excessive heat of this nature, with little relief occurring overnight due to very warm low temperatures, can be dangerous - especially to those who are most vulnerable.

Hot and dry weather is expected June 28th through July 6th. Record high temperatures are possible during this period! The 10 Day Outlook shows high probabilities of above normal temperatures and a decent probability of below normal precipitation. With temperatures approaching high 90's and over 100 degrees for most of Montana, coupled with the 4th of July holiday, the possibility of fire starts grows by the day. Keep in mind that this weather may worsen existing drought conditions and may elevate fire weather concerns at times depending on local wind conditions.

Heat can escalate quickly. . .with hotter temps in the forecast next week, now is a good time to review some heat safety. Never leave people or pets alone in a car, stay hydrated, wear light clothing, and run the A/C. It is also a good idea to avoid strenuous activities outdoors.
